

TACLS Conference 2004

The TACLS Conference 2004 was held at the Westchase Hilton in Houston, April 1-3, 2004. The first day of the conference included workshops on FISH (fluorescent in situ hybridization) and Multiple Myeloma testing. Workshop participants had an opportunity to get some hands on experience with these techniques. At the same time, the opening rounds for CLT and CLS student bowl competition began. The keynote speaker was Kenneth L. Mattox, M.D., F.A.C.S., a trauma surgeon from Houston. Dr.



Mattox is one of the most recognized surgeons in America and has developed many innovative techniques and surgical treatments and has a surgical procedure named after him. Dr. Mattox

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gave an entertaining and provocative presentation on health care issues and concerns for the future.

Scientific sessions were offered in the afternoon. A grand opening of the exhibits was held



later in the afternoon and included light refershments sponsored by the Gulf Coast Regional Blood Center. On Friday morning, conference participants enjoyed a continental breakfast and attended scientific sessions and the final rounds of the

Karen was also the keynote speaker at the luncheon and spoke on leadership development and involved all attendees in a personality assessment "True Colors" which identified common traits in four personality types.

Member of the Year, and Student Bowl teams. John Wentz was the recipient of the Member of the Year Award. A business meeting followed the Awards Program and the major items of business was the nomination and election of delegates to the House of Delegates at ASCLS in Los Angeles.

On Saturday morning, a smaller dedicated group enjoyed a relaxing continental breakfast before the scientific sessions. The luncheon featured ASCLS President, Barbara Brown as the keynote



speaker. Barbara discussed the importance of ASCLS as an advocate for laboratory professionals. She described the efforts of ASCLS in lobbying against the Medicare Copayment proposal, and supporting funding of the Allied Health Restoration Act, which would provide scholarships and financial support for clinical laboratory students and educational programs.

A business meeting followed the luncheon. Karen Chandler and Becky See presented a check to Imeka Hatfield from the Children's Miracle Network.

Almost 300 laboratorians attended this year's conference. More than 150 students attended. We hope to have another successful conference in Corpus Christi next year. The dates will be March 31-April 2 at the Corpus Christi Omni Hotel.

Keeping Our Students Involved

Each week I get an update on the new ASCLS members by state and category of membership. It amazes me how many student members we have in this organization. Each report lists more new student members than PF1 or PF2 new members. This disparity increases as the time for the state meetings draw closer. Also, at many of the annual state meetings in Region VII, student attendees outnumber the other categories of member attendees. I



deduce from this, that many educators are doing a great job at getting their students to understand the benefits of ASCLS membership. One of the big draws for student membership in Texas and Louisiana for CLT/CLS students is the annual student bowl. Students love to participate in the student bowl but must be members of ASCLS to do so. I know also that students who attend the state and national meetings love the experience and promise to come back next year. When I met a group of students waiting for the elevator at our national meeting several years ago, I asked how they liked the meeting. They were gushing with comments about how much fun they had and how great the exhibits were. They vowed to come back the next year. So why don't the majority come back or even renew membership as first year professionals (FYP)?

The number of FYP is far below what is expected based on previous year's student members. That means we are losing a great number of members. Student members only pay \$25 to join ASCLS and FYPs only pay \$40 (plus state dues). Even at \$40, that's only about \$3.50 per month, about the price of a meal at McDonalds. Price can't be the reason we loose these students as FYP members. Perhaps we need a study to identify the reasons students don't elect FYP membership so we can address

the problem head-on. On the other hand, I think many of us already have a good idea of why we loose students once they graduate. These reasons include:

• Graduates move and do not give ASCLS a forwarding address. ASCLS has tried to address this by having the student list a permanent address such as their parents' address on the application.

• Graduates are not encouraged to join by their supervisors or colleagues at the bench. I have heard from many graduates that the individuals they work with do not even know about ASCLS

(although they may remember ASMT) or they belong to ASCP and don't know the difference in the value of membership in ASCLS.

- Graduates are actually discouraged from joining ASCLS by colleagues.
- They get engrossed in their new life and don't remember to renew if they don't get a renewal notice. Then they fall into the trap with their colleagues.

However, all of this is anecdotal information. I have never seen a study with empirical data.

Occasionally we see the students become very active members of ASCLS. In Region VII, we have several that have progressed into state and national leadership positions. In San Antonio, there are two former students who have stayed very active in TACLS and ASCLS despite being surrounded at work by those who are not

interested in joining a professional organization. However, these two individuals have a great supervisor who recognizes the potential in them and allows them to go to continuing education sessions and state and national meetings without taking vacation. This is on the condition that they give a presentation on what they learned to those who stayed in the lab. I am intrigued by the question as to why these two continue to be involved in their professional organization and their classmates do not. They all took the same classes from the same instructors. Louisiana has two recent graduates who served as President of the LSCLS and one moved into a national committee position. What keeps these members motivated?

I think this would make a great research study. If anyone is interested, grant money is available from the E&R Fund in ASCLS. Proposals are due June 1. You can get the directions from the ASCLS Website. Go to ascls.org, click on leadership, click on appointed committees and then on the Education and Research Fund (E&R) link. Anyone interested? 
