

TACLS Fall Board Meeting

The TACLS Fall Board Meeting and contiinuing education program was held at the Gulf Coast Blood Center in Houston on Saturday, October 18. Vicki Hopwood, Program Director of the Cytogenetics Program at UT MD Anderson, gave a one hour PACE–approved presentation on Paroxysmal Nocturnal Hemoglobinuria.

The TACLS Board meeting followed the presentation. Topics that were discussed included the distribution of the TACLS Public Service Announcements to television stations around Texas. The keynote speaker will be Charles Lauer, Editor of *Modern Healthcare*. A wide range of topics will be presented with something for everyone. The conference will be held at the West Chase Hilton from Thursday, April 1, through Saturday, April 3.

Focus on Laboratory Professionals

In this day and age of distance education, which generally means bringing the educational opportunity to students who are unable to relocate to a university campus, there are some instances when the instructors are also at a distance to the university. I am one of those people. I live in south Florida in the Ft. Lauderdale area and have been teaching at University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, Texas, since January of 2000. For about a year of this time, it was necessary for me to reside in Galveston full-time which was an interesting opportunity but a challenge to be away from my husband and young son. During that time I usually flew home every third weekend.

For the past year and a half I have worked parttime on campus, being there about once or twice a month. My usual work week at home involves morning or early afternoon hours devoted to course development or grading electronic papers. Some of my courses are completely online exercises that require students to participate by submitting papers or quizzes to test their knowledge of specific topics before they take an exam. Other courses have narrated lectures that students listen to on their own time and then participate in study questions, problem-solving exercises or quizzes. They still have to participate in some "real class time" by going to a virtual classroom for a webchat. I usually ask them a lot of questions about the topic at hand and determine if they are getting it figured out. The distance students don't seem to notice any difference whether I am on my computer in Florida or in Texas. I am usually just as responsive to their emails. Some of the students are usually shocked to know that I even have been using a dial-up modem for my uploading of lecture material or internet webchats. They seem to think that anything short of DSL is



not possible. Maybe someday I can graduate up to a faster internet connection at home!

I usually drive the 1300 miles and consider it an interesting way to have some reflection and down time as I drive across Interstate 10. I get a chance to listen to best-selling books on tape that I might not otherwise take the time to read. I can conduct some school business along the way with my cell-phone and take my lap-top computer with me to log onto the internet at night. During the summer months, when my son is out of school, he tags along. He has enjoyed three summers coming to Galveston, making friends, going to Moody Gardens summer camps and NASA space camps. So in distance education, sometimes even the instructors are at a distance.





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
